Shevington High School Youth Travel Ambassador success!!

Shevington High School recently attended the Youth Travel Ambassador campaign pitch event in Manchester where a group of around 10 students presented to a panel on their ideas to help reduce traffic around their school and to support more students to travel to school actively.

The youth group have developed plans to setup a 'Park and Stride' at a local pub where parents can drop students and they can walk the final 0.5 miles to school. To encourage students to take part in the initiative the school will be providing a range of rewards that will hopefully support long term behaviour change

The school were awarded £500 to develop the scheme. Shevington High School are the only Wigan School currently taking part in the Youth Travel Ambassador scheme, which is evidence of the schools commitment to supporting the clean air agenda. Refill shop for schools

<u>Schools from across Greater Manchester</u> have joined an exciting new scheme setting up refill shops within their schools. Delivered in partnership with <u>Pupil Profit</u>, the scheme is an ethical enterprise delivering personal, social and health education.

The school shops will sell refills of household products such as body wash and hand wash, with pupils encouraged to bring in containers to refill. The products are made in the UK, cruelty free, vegan, closed loop and environmentally responsible, and crucially they are also affordably priced.

The aim is to give young people the skills and tools to play a part in tackling he climate and ecological emergency and be part of the UK's low-carbon circular through a school eco refill shop. The school shops will also tackle so much more than reusing old plastic containers and refilling with a great product, they also support learning workplace skills, building good habits and taking responsibility for the success of the shop.





Earth Day 2024 - 22nd April

The Earth Day theme for 2024 is 'Planet vs Plastic' which focuses on bringing about an end to the demand on plastic and a 60% reduction on plastic production by 2024. There are lots of ways to address this issue when dealing with young people, from looking at the plastic in our lunch box to fast fashion.

Schools Good Life Charter

The <u>Schools' Good Life Charter</u> supports students to co-design their own Good Life Charter to help their whole school community break the spell of excessive consumption, which makes children feel inadequate, judged and unhappy, and is a major contributor to our climate and ecological crisis. Young people taking part in Schools' Good Life

Charter will learn about the harmful impacts of over-consumption and about what influences people to consume excessively.

The programme aims to nurture compassionate values and wellbeing within students, as well as create a space for everyone to discuss why and what we buy, encouraging low-consumption behaviours within the school community and beyond.
