# Lowton West Primary School - COVID-19 Risk Assessment

# September 2021 (Reviewed December 2021)

The government continues to manage the risk of serious illness from the spread of the virus. Step 4 marked a new phase in the government's response to the pandemic, moving away from stringent restrictions on everyone's day-to-day lives, towards advising people on how to protect themselves and others, alongside targeted interventions to reduce risk. As COVID-19 becomes a virus that we learn to live with, there is now an imperative to reduce the disruption to children and young people's education - particularly given that the direct clinical risks to children are extremely low, and every adult has been offered a first vaccine and the opportunity for 2 doses by mid-September.

The government's priority is for schools to deliver face-to-face, high-quality education to all pupils. The evidence is clear that being out of education causes significant harm to educational attainment, life chances, mental and physical health.

At Lowton West, the school's Risk assessment for September 2021 has been revised in line with the latest government operational guidance (which was last reviewed on August 17<sup>th</sup> 2021)

By following and adhering to this risk assessment, we will ensure that Lowton West can prioritise the delivery of face-to-face, high quality education to all pupils.

NB: The four main control measures are:

- 1. Ensure good hygiene for everyone.
- 2. Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes.
- 3. Keep occupied spaces well ventilated.
- 4. Follow public health advice on testing, self-isolation and managing confirmed cases of COVID-19.

## **Updated 14<sup>th</sup> December 2021:**

From 14 December 2021, adults who are fully vaccinated and all children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years and 6 months identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 are strongly advised to take a LFD test every day for 7 days and continue to attend their setting as normal, unless they have a positive test result. Daily testing of close contacts applies to all contacts who are:

- fully vaccinated adults people who have had 2 doses of an approved vaccine
- all children and young people aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, regardless of their vaccination status
- people who are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons
- people taking part, or have taken part, in an approved clinical trial for a COVID-19 vaccine

Children under 5 years are exempt from self-isolation and do not need to take part in daily testing of close contacts.

Pupils with SEND identified as close contacts should be supported by their school and their families to agree the most appropriate route for testing including, where appropriate, additional support to assist swabbing. For further information, see SEND guidance.

### **Updated 22<sup>nd</sup> December 2021:**

# Information on the changes to the self-isolation period for individuals who test positive for COVID-19:

Since Wednesday 22 December, the 10 day self-isolation period for people who record a positive PCR test result for COVID-19 has been reduced to 7 days in most circumstances, unless you cannot test for any reason.

Individuals may now take LFD tests on day 6 and day 7 of their self-isolation period. Those who receive two negative test results are no longer required to complete 10 full days of self-isolation. The first test must be taken no earlier than day 6 of the self-isolation period and tests must be taken 24 hours apart.

This also applies to children under 5, with LFD testing at parental or guardian discretion. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result and return to your education setting from day 8.

- If anyone in the school develops COVID-19 symptoms, however mild, they will be sent home and should follow current public health advice.
- For everyone with symptoms, they should avoid using public transport and, wherever possible, be collected by a member of their family or household.
- If a pupil is awaiting collection, they will wait in the dedicated isolation room and a window should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. If close contact is necessary, staff should wear appropriate PPE. The room will be cleaned after they have left.
- The household (including any siblings) should follow the PHE <u>stay at home</u> guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection.

## 7.2 Asymptomatic testing:

Staff should resume twice weekly home Lateral Flow tests from Monday 30<sup>th</sup>
August (every Monday and Thursday) until the end of September, when this
will also be reviewed.

#### **Updated December 2021:**

Testing remains important in reducing the risk of transmission of infection within schools. Staff and secondary school pupils should continue to test twice weekly at home, with lateral flow device (LFD) test kits, 3-4 days apart. Testing remains voluntary but is strongly encouraged.

The Dfe guidance states that schools are strongly encouraged to ask parents and other visitors to take a lateral flow device (LFD) test before entering the school. At Lowton West, we will ask visitors to take a lateral flow test before visiting.

There is no need for primary age pupils (those in year 6 and below) to regularly test, unless they have been identified as a contact for someone who has tested positive for Covid-19 and therefore advised to take lateral flow tests every day for 7 days.

#### 7.3 Confirmed PCR tests:

- Staff and pupils with a positive LFD test result should self-isolate in line with the stay at home guidance. They will also need to get a free PCR test to check if they have COVID-19.
- Whilst awaiting the PCR result, the individual should continue to self-isolate.
